## Canada's Unions: Lifting Everyone Up

#### 2,500 workers cathered from across the country in Montreal

This was my first CLC convention and how exciting it was to see the greater union movement gathering to bring progressive change to our workplaces and communities.

We were inspired by the calls to work together for a better future by Chris Smalls, the US labour leader who took on Amazon, and trade union leaders from Hong Kong and Haiti. Team UNITE was re-elected for another term. They are honoured to continue serving Canada's workers and to build on the work of the past two years.

Delegates delivered heartfelt speeches and powerful interventions from the convention floor to highlight issues impacting workers and strengthening resolutions. Action Plans were passed on affordability, Indigenous justice, climate crisis, care economy, building up Canada and organizing.



Currently there are no Yukon Federation of Labour representatives on any of the CLC Committees.

I would like that to change. But I know this is asking "just one more thing' from our labour activists in the territory, and I know that our numbers are much smaller than other federations.


Yukon united way Gave \$105,000.00
